Malfroy School Community Consultation Survey



In today's newsletter we have provided a summary of the responses.

Overall, the community consultation highlights positive feedback from parents and caregivers who completed the survey over a 3-week period. Arguably the timing of the survey coinciding with the COVID-19 lockdown did not allow staff to engage with parents and caregivers as we had done in 2019. The number of responses represents 28% of the total number of parents and caregivers of our school community.

An initial analysis of the written comments indicates respondents have thought carefully about providing feedback that is worthy of further discussion and reflection.

Malfroy School Community Consultation Survey Term 3 2021

As a parent I feel welcome with the school community

99% agree. The community affirmed Malfroy School as inclusive, safe, community minded, caring and providing a happy learning environment.

Our school has a good reputation in the community.

93% agree that Malfroy School has a good reputation.

I feel my culture and others are valued and recognised in the school community.

91% agree. Malfroy has a broad range of ethnicities. Celebrating all often would be great. Include more Maori in the curriculum. *If Maori, how can we best cater for the learning and other needs of your tamariki?*

95% agree. Parents feel children settle well when starting school, and are well supported academically and socially.

Principal is approachable and adaptable to the needs of the community.

97% agree. Amazing, supportive, caring, helpful.

I receive sufficient information and communication from the Board of Trustees.

80% agree. Governance is a difficult area to effectively convey to the community in an effective way that makes it interesting.

The school sets high expectations of learning for its students.

84% agree. My children are expected to reach their potential.

The school provides effective methods of communication/feedback when reporting to the parents on student progress and achievements.

97% agree.

The school provides appropriate curriculum resources to support my child's learning and development. 92% agree. The school is well resourced. More Te Reo Maori. More swimming. Teachers provide the tools needed.

All students should get homework.

70% agree. Mixed views on homework. Should be relevant to the class programme and needs based.

The homework my child/children currently receive is purposeful to their learning needs. 73% agree.

I have enough information to help my child at home with his/her learning. 84% agree.

Learning to use digital tools appropriately, are important for future focussed skills learning. 88% agree. The way of the future. Teach children problem solving and practical skills also.

What procedures/tools around the safe and responsible use of the internet and digital technologies do you have at home?

44% - age appropriate content filters on devices.

36% - device policy at home.

16% - modem internet filtering.
